After reading, talk about the story, characters, and pictures.

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
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Tūī Has a Plan

"I must get home to my nest to check the eggs," says Weka.




Weka spins and flaps.

"I cannot see my nest,"

says Weka.

"We need a plan,"

says Tūī.



"I can fly up to see where to go. When I sing, run to catch up with me," says Tūī.



Tūī glides on top
of the fog.
"I hope the eggs
are safe," thinks Weka.
Tūī sings, and Weka runs.



"I see my nest,"
says Weka.

"The eggs are safe,
and I am home."



"You had a good plan,
Tūī," says Weka.

"Ka pai."

Teaching Notes

Focus point

• This book includes the split digraph **o_e**. Tell children how the silent **e** at the end makes the vowel sound long. There is a sound card for **o_e**.

Before reading

This book provides children with the opportunity to practise reading the letters and sounds they are learning in meaningful connected text.

Say each sound quickly



Blend the sounds together to read a word



High-frequency words



During reading

- Show the book to the children and read the title together. Make a connection between the title and the picture.
- The children read each page together using their decoding skills. Once the page is read, guide them to connect the meaning of the text with the illustration.
- If a child gets stuck while reading, help them blend the sounds together to read the word.

Words to tell



Remind children to sound out the letters they already know.

Kupu Māori | Māori words



Here, you could include children who speak te reo Māori as the language experts.

Spelling

Use previously learned letters and sounds to help children spell and read words. If this word spells **home**, can you spell **hope**? Change **hope** to **hose**.

- home → hope → hose → chose
- ride \rightarrow rode \rightarrow mode \rightarrow made

Vocabulary

Tell the children the meaning of any new vocabulary:

- creeps: to move quietly and close to the ground
- fog: thick, damp air that looks like mist
- loops: makes circles
- · glides: moves smoothly
- ka pai: well done; good
- awa: river

After reading

Discussion questions

- Why can't Weka see his nest?
- How does Tūī help Weka to find his nest?
- Why couldn't Weka fly up to see the way like Tūī?

Story discussion

In the story, Tūī and Weka are surrounded by fog. Discuss why Weka couldn't fly up to see the way to go. Weka is a flightless bird (as we found out in *Weka in a Flap*), so he can't fly above the fog like Tūī.

Fluency

Reread the story to build accuracy and fluency.

Story retell

Ask the children to retell the story to a buddy.




Rākau Tree
